Introduction

You have in your hands a series of eight discussion guides with topics for Encounters with Christ as a team or community. These resources seek to help with apostolic discernment on concrete topics from our life and surroundings. We seek to listen, with all members of Regnum Christi, to the voice of the Lord who invites us to go out and respond to the different needs of the world and the Church from our charism.

Eight areas of the apostolic activity of Regnum Christi have been chosen, which are found in number 11 of the Statutes of the Regnum Christi Federation. These are:

- 1. The proclamation of the Faith and the New Evangelization
- 2. The Christian formation and education of children
- 3. The Christian formation and education of adolescents
- 4. The Christian formation and education of youth
- 5. The promotion of marriage and the family
- 6. Vocational culture and ministry
- 7. The evangelization of professional and cultural environments
- 8. Social justice and practice of the works of mercy

Each one of these discussion guides is meant to be used as an Encounter with Christ, in such a way that as a community we can go deeper into each topic and discern what the Lord is inviting us to do as a team, as a section, and as Regnum Christi. With these discussion guides, the topic that is proposed for discussion takes the place of the case study. In addition to this material, we have the essay published on the Solemnity of the Sacred Heart: The Encounter with Christ in the Life of Regnum Christi: Identity, Foundation, and Dynamic, which explains to us the deep meaning of the Encounter and each one of its parts. This activity, which occupies a central place in the life of the members of Regnum Christi, puts us in contact with the Word and orients the communal discernment of what the Lord expects of us as a team or community.

We offer you here a few practical tips on how to use these discussion guides:

1. With respect to the content of the discussion guides:

Choice of the topic: there are eight topics. Although the discussion guides are numbered in a specific order, not every team has to do all eight topics, nor in that order. Each team is invited to choose those topics that they feel called to contribute to, though it may not be an area that touches their reality or stage of life directly. Each topic should be done in at least one session of the Encounter with Christ, but it can also be done in two sessions if it is considered necessary. It is advisable to know the topic to be discussed beforehand, so as not to waste time choosing it during the Encounter, and in case it is possible to come prepared.

Limitation to one's own environment: discernment of the proposed topics has to be done by placing ourselves in the reality of our own concrete environment, so that we avoid generic reflections and information. Therefore, although each discussion guide includes a general introduction to the topic, the unfolding of the Encounter has to specify the real environment in which we live and move, since that is where we are called to respond. The introduction offers us a description of the topic for discussion, its scope, and what we seek in that Encounter. Parts: the Encounter follows the ordinary outline of all Encounters with Christ. There is an opening prayer to place ourselves in the presence of God and ask the Holy Spirit for his guidance and light. Then there is the Gospel reflection, for which a passage is provided along with some alternative options. It is recommended that sufficient time be dedicated to the prayerful reading of the Gospel, since discernment is illuminated by it alone. After having encountered Christ through his Word, we turn to the communal discernment of what He expects of us. The discussion guide offers some questions that serve to orient the reflection, following the method of see, judge, and act.

Apostolic dynamism: the fruit of the Encounter with Christ takes shape in actions of conversion in our life and apostolate. In addition to the questions that the discussion guide poses, it is good to listen to see if there is any action that the Lord is inviting us to personally and as a team.

2. Regarding methodology:

Time: it is recommended that the team leader help the team to reach the end of the process of discernment on each topic. Therefore, aware of the time at their disposal (that which is normally set aside for Encounters), they need to calculate the duration of each part and help to carry the conversation along. It is important to ensure that they get to all the different questions. The final question of each discussion guide helps to specify the formulation of what we have perceived to be the invitation of God in that specific area. As we mentioned above, a topic can be discussed in one or two sessions/moments of Encounter with Christ.

Secretary: in addition to the team leader, one person should be assigned to act as the secretary of each Encounter, since it is important to keep track of what each team sees and proposes in order to discern it in the next step of the process. Therefore, there is a link at the end of each discussion guide where the notes of each Encounter are collected. It is not necessary to write down everything that is said, but only those things that are most interesting and best represent the topic that is being discerned, as well as the concrete resolutions.

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Vocational Culture and Ministry

In recent decades, the Church has made important progress in understanding more fully and deeply the mystery of vocation. This has necessarily had an impact on the way in which we understand and live vocational ministry.

Two concepts are especially significant on this path and have been the point of departure for the reflection that continues today:

- The understanding of the Church as the pilgrim people of God and as the community of the baptized in which each individual has received a gratuitious call of God's love and has been sent as a response to the evangelizing needs of the world today.
- The universal call to holiness, and, consequently, the appreciation for the vocation of the laity. The Church is therefore understood as a body with different members (see 1 Cor 12:12), with different gifts which must be given a place, since everyone contributes to the holiness of the members and of the body as a whole.

These two concepts enlightened and expanded the notion that was held of the religious life as the "state of perfection" and as the path in which the Christian life was full realized. Consequently, vocational ministry, which was understood principally as the promotion of the religious or priestly life, began to be understood from a new perspective, as a service to all believers to help them discover the gift of the vocation each one had received, without considering one path better than another:

"Vocation ministry is understood as the constant and coordinated action of the ecclesial community so that each of its members may recognize the call that God makes to them and to which they must respond generously. It seeks that each person may discover the path to the realization of a life project according to God's will and the needs of today's world. In responding, each one will recognize the service or ministry that he/she will render in the community." (cf. Final Document of the 2nd Latin-American Continental Congress on Vocations, 2011, n. 78-80)

In this discussion guide we seek to renew our understanding of vocation ministry and discern how we are called to know, value, and foster all Christian vocations.

(A) 1. Opening prayer

We begin this activity with a prayer, asking the Holy Spirit to enlighten our understanding, move our wills, and enkindle our hearts.

It is appropriate to add a Hail Mary or other prayer to invoke the Blessed Virgin, a Glory Be, and the invocations proper to Regnum Christi which seal our prayer by pointing to the goal of all our life and actions – the glory of God.

(1) 2. Prayerful reading of the Word

We seek to encounter him in the Gospel in order to place ourselves in an attitude of listening, so that faith and charity will guide our reflections, order our values, and orient our discernment.

A passage of the Gospel is chosen. It could be from the previous or next Sunday, or another passage that is appropriate to the needs of the team.

For today's encounter, please choose one of the following Gospel passages:

John 14: 1-7 I am the Way, the Truth, and the Life

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Alternative Gospels:

John 15: 1-8 The vine and the branches Luke 1: 26-38 The Annunciation Mark 3: 13-19 He called those whom he wanted

heta 3. Apostolic discernment of reality

After we have encountered Christ through his Word, we undertake a communal discernment of what he expects of us as a team or community in the circumstances of life in which we find ourselves. Consequently, we will observe the reality in which we are immersed with the desire to discover the best way to carry out our mission of evangelization within it. For today's encounter with Christ, using the questions provided in this discussion guide, please reflect on: "Vocational culture and ministry".

To see

We want to see the case as God sees it, learning to observe life with objectivity and depth, with reason and faith, discovering how God is present in it.

- How do we understand the Christian vocation? How do we see that the personal call of God is manifested in a concrete way according to one's own state in life?
- How does our vocation unite all the aspects of our life? What elements help us to live our vocation fully?

(1) To judge

After we have become more aware of the presence of the wheat and the weeds in the case we have chosen (see Matthew 13:24-30), we want to discern how Jesus judges or interprets our presence, participation, or attitudes before this case, and, consequently, understand what he hopes for from us.

- Do we know and value all of the different states of life in the Church? Do we consider that all are equally important and that they complement one another? How do we live and promote this?
- What challenges do we find in making known the vocation to the consecrated life and accompany those who feel called to it in their discernment?
- Do we believe that Regnum Christ offers an environment that helps to understand life as a vocation? What elements facilitate discovering and embracing it?
- To what degree do you think that Regnum Christi in your locality is responding to the needs of people in this field of evangelization?

$\begin{pmatrix} 1\\ & \end{pmatrix}$ To act

This is the moment to choose what actions of conversion and apostolate we are called to in light of what we have discerned that Christ is asking of us. We seek to respond to the invitation from the Lord that we received through the Gospel judgement with our own evangelizing initiative. In this way, we aspire to transform reality with the criteria of the Gospel.

The members suggest possible actions to carry out with regard to themselves, with the goal of their own conversion, and with regard to the reality affected by the case, with the goal of evangelization In response to the call experienced in the "to judge" element:

• As a team, how can we collaborate with God in his work of making present the kingdom in this area of evangelization?

4. Closing prayer

The Encounter with Christ concludes with a prayer of thanksgiving by one or several members.

The prayer closes with the two invocations to Christ the King and the Virgin Mary proper to Regnum Christi.



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
